Influential Neighborhood Association Throws its Support Behind Jan Perry
Endorsement Adds Fuel to Perry's Grassroots Powered Campaign

Los Angeles, Calif. (February 7, 2020) — United Homeowners' Association II (UHA II) has endorsed Jan Perry's campaign for Los Angeles County Supervisor for the 2nd District. UHA II is a 100% volunteer organization that advocates for the residents of unincorporated Windsor Hills, View Heights, and View Park on issues that impact social welfare, the economy and the environment. UHA II is focused on hyper-local political engagement and is highly influential in electoral politics.

"Our communities will no longer tolerate elected officials who work harder for the special interests than their own constituents, said John Heath," president of UHA II. "We're tired of machine politics that deliver ineffective local candidates, scandals, corruption, pay-to-play, back-room deals and special interests controlling our political agenda, and that's why our members voted overwhelmingly to endorse Jan Perry. She has a record of delivering excellent constituent services, economic development and smart urban planning. She is the right candidate for these challenging times."

Perry is famous for bringing much needed resources into the neighborhoods she represented. She oversaw the development of two urban wetlands, and she was the first to bring permanent supportive housing into the City of Los Angeles to address homelessness in the 9th District.

"I am proud to have earned the endorsement of United Homeowners' Association II," said Perry. "I look forward to working with them to tackle gridlock, shut down the Inglewood Oil Fields and create more recreational and green space for families to enjoy."

Jan Perry served 12 years on the Los Angeles City Council as the representative of the 9th District, which encompasses Downtown and South LA. She is considered one of the architects of the Downtown renaissance and was responsible for catalytic projects such as LA Live. During her tenure she was responsible for the creation of \$15 billion in investment, \$52 million in net new tax revenue for the City of Los Angeles, and 90,000 full-time jobs.

From July 2013 to December 2018, Perry served as the general manager of the City of Los Angeles Economic Workforce Development Department (EWDD) where she oversaw a broad range of programs offering assistance to business, job seekers and disconnected youth. During her tenure, the department enrolled approximately 91,000 people in its training and placement programs. Currently, she serves as the executive director of the Infrastructure Funding Alliance, a national initiative to meet future infrastructure, economic development, and environmental challenges. She lives in Ladera Heights with her daughter and her rescue dog Frank.
